May 13... - 7 P.M. Rm 201 and Zoom Chernobyl Ant - Tyer: Steve Kerkhof

Cost: \$2.00 in person, \$3.00 for kit mailed to your house

The Chernobyl ant was created by trout guides in Utah but it is a proven fish catcher for warm water species too.

Materials

Thread: Brown 6/0, 140 Denier Thread

Hook: Size 8, straight shank, round bend hook, 3X or 4X long Body: 2 strips, 2mm foam, 2 colors, we'll use tan and black

strips are 1 hook gap wide, 1.5 x longer than hook, bright

color foam for indicator (optional small chenille)

Legs: Round rubber legs, color optional

May 27 - 7 P.M. Rm 201 and Zoom Sofa Pillow – Tyer: Fred Kaufmann

Cost: \$2.00 in person, \$3.00 for kit mailed to your house

Learn to tie a Sofa Pillow fly, a variation on the stimulator pattern.

Materials:

Hook: Size 4 terrestrial hook

Thread: 210 denier GSP or similar heavy thread

Body/wing: Elk hair, dark grey or rust and off white cream

Rib:Copper wire

Dubbing: Rust and golden or cream

Hackle: 2 Furnace Hackles, 1 rust and 1 cream and black




HOW TO GET YOUR TYING KIT

In My Dreams: Fishing the Morpheus Pool

Even through my waders the water feels cool as it swirls gently about my legs. The few leaves that remain upon the tree limbs rattle dryly as a light breeze weaves along the river course. The rose colored sun hangs low just above the distant hills, and on this late fall afternoon provides scant warmth.

There is a dull ache in my casting arm for it was many hours ago when I dropped my first caddis imitation upon the nose of a hungry rainbow. This has been a day unlike any day I've had before, for from the moment I arrived there began a steady hatch of Caddis flies coming off the water. I try to recall the number of trout; rainbows, and browns, I have caught and released this day, but I cannot—more than twenty I think. Regardless of the number, it is the spirit of the fish I recall, their fighting ability; the rainbows launching themselves into space, performing midair acrobatics — the browns diving deep, burrowing into the waters' darkness in fruitless effort to rid themselves of the invisible pull upon their jaw.

The rise forms, fewer now, have taken on a purple-pink pastel hue in dull mimic of the western sky. The time when I should have left for home has passed but I hate to relegate this perfect day to memory. So I stand thigh deep in the slow current of a large pool preparing for one more cast—one more perfect cast, for this day my loops have been tight, my presentations perfect, and not a single fly left in a tree top.

I search the pool looking for the rise that will betray the feeding trout and provide a target for the final cast... There! Against the far bank, just downstream from a partially submerged log, are slowly expanding, tell-tale circles—much like the rings of a target encircling a bulls-eye. The distance to the rise is far more than I would normally attempt, but this day I'm certain I can reach it.

I lay out a couple of false casts to the rear of the rise to check for the proper distance. On the third forward cast I kill the line's forward motion high and allow the fly to fall slackly to the water, two feet in front of where I suspect the trout to be lying. Slowly it drifts, one foot, then two. Nothing. Another foot. And another. Still nothing. Thinking I have missed, for the only time that day, I move to pick up the fly and go home.



Just then the fly disappears and the line goes tight. Almost before I can react the water boils from the thrashing of a large fish; a mighty fish. In the pale light I see a slab of golden flank as the fish rolls near the surface, then dives, looking to return to that safe place in the deepest darkest part of the pool. The line sings as it is ripped from the reel and speeds through the guides. I feel the line vibrate rapidly and I imagine it is from the shaking of its large head. I let him run and apply only slight pressure to the rim of the reel trying merely to hang on and turn his head away from the submerged log. He does turn and I breath a sigh of relief knowing that if he had made it to the log he would have broken me off. I begin to play him with light but even pressure for I know my tippet is fine and light, yet I play him with a sense of confidence.

As the big brown turns I'm able to take back some line and I am thankful for the small gain. He then runs upstream taking back the line he had just given me. He moves to the head of the pool where the current is stronger. I know this is to my advantage for here he must fight the current and the rod; he finds he can not. As he turns downstream I am forced to strip in line by hand in order to keep pressure upon him. As he moves to the tail of the pool I wade downstream with him in order to neutralize the slight current; however, I am able to again get him on the reel.

Over a period of several minutes this scenario is repeated again and again. His runs are shorter now and with less energy. Eventually his large speckled snout comes to the surface and I am able to drag him to the net. He is magnificent. I remove the hook from his lower jaw and hold him lightly into the current allowing the water to flow across his gills. Soon he is strong enough to swim away and with a strong kick of his tail he is gone. But that's good for I know I will see him again—In my dreams.

Will it take a Wooly Bugger? This arapaima is a nasty looking finned creature, nasty as in tough, mean, maybe dangerous. The press reported a specimen of arapaima was found on the bank of Caloosahatchee between Fort Myers and Cape Coral, Fla. Notice in the second photo in the New York Post story, there's a hook in its mouth, maybe two. My guess is someone caught it and when he or she pulled it in, thought it might be Jaws and cut the line. Gonna need a bigger boat, that's for sure. Fly Line Recycling

Flyvines is a Montana company that "upcycles" used fly line into bracelets, lanyards, dog collars, sunglass straps and other useful items that give used fly line a second life. The picture shows used fly line collected by TVFF in 2019 that didn't end up in a landfill. The pandemic kept us from doing that in 2020 but we'd like to participate again this year. If you respool your fly reels with new line then please coil it up and bring it to us. TVFF will pack it in a box and send it Flyvines. It is a small thing you can do to be kind to the environment and support our conservation efforts.

If prompted, you should click yes to allow Zoom to use the camera and microphone on your computer, then we can see and hear you during the meeting. You may be placed in a Zoom "waiting room" when you first join. Be patient and you will be admitted to the meeting by a host or cohost. This is another layer of security for our online meetings.

April speaker Tracy Doughty

Thank you Tracy Doughty for your informative presentation on the COVID pandemic as it relates to Madison County and north Alabama. Tracy is Huntsville Hospital's Vice President of Operations and will become the hospital's President and Chief Operating Officer on July 1. Tracy said efforts to contain the COVID virus are "going very well," but he cautioned that masks, social distancing, and common-sense precautions are still very much in our future. He said at least 100,000 COVID vaccinations had been given in Madison County (as of mid-April). He said annual vaccination boosters probably will be needed.



This year's Free Fishing Day is June 12, 2021

Each year, the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources designates a "Free Fishing Day" for the public to fish recreationally in public waters without a fishing license.

The event is part of National Fishing and Boating Week, which runs June 5-13, 2021.

State Public Fishing Lakes still require a fishing permit on Free Fishing Day, and fishing in a private pond requires the pond owner's permission. Some piers may also require fees and permits.

Casting for Recovery Fly Boxes



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
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
