

Fly tying sessions will be conducted at Faith Presbyterian Church, Room 201, at 7 p.m.

April 10th, 7 PM Black Ghost, Tyer – Jon Reinecke Cost: \$3

An easy to tie classic streamer pattern. Invented by Herb Welch, this fly works on salmon, steelhead and trout.

Materials:

Hook: 6x Streamer Thread: Black thread

Body: Black floss and silver tinsel

Tail: Yellow hackle

Wing: White bucktail or marabou



April 24, 7 PM Psycho Prince Nymph, Tyer – Andy King Cost: \$3

A flashier version of the classic Prince Nymph! Tie this on to attract fish!

Materials:

Hook: Size #12 – 16
Thread: Size 8/0
Body: Ice dubbing
Wing: White turkey biot
Other: Copper wire

Kevin lives in the Phoenix, Arizona area and his videos are uniquely focused on fishing the various canals that flow through the Phoenix area that are part of the Salt River Project (I lived in the Phoenix area for four years and traveled there frequently for 15 and never knew there were fish in those canals). Kevin also takes fishing trips to Northern Arizona, Montana and Alaska for fishing vacations. Kevin fishes for bass, tilapia and carp in the canals and trout in the other locations.

Kevin's channel is one of my favorites due to his absolute enthusiasm that he has when catching fish. Every fish Kevin catches is as if it is the first fish he has ever caught. His videos are 8 to 10 minutes of pure joy and fun and are not like any other fishing video on YouTube. Kevin's approach is simple, using basic tackle and flies while catching a whole lot of fish.
















Fish of the Month cont.

It was a pleasure presenting to you and your club members tonight. Tim really enjoyed it and we hope everyone learned a little something about what trout like to eat!





Trout Handling Best Practice

Catch and release is something our club really emphasizes. We all love to fish and want to protect our fisheries. When it comes to trout, they an be delicate. In order to not harm the fish, below are some rules to safely release fish to be caught another day. Although this article is centered around trout, these rules apply to all fish. Authored by Andrew Braker, the entire article can be found on Fly Lords here. Next time you are on the water, remember these rules and try to use them.


- 1. Wet your hands Fish have a protective slime on them. This coating helps them stay healthy. Not wetting your hands could risk wiping this slime off and hurting the fish.
- **2.** Use barbless hooks Barbless hooks are easier to move and significantly lower the risk of injuring the fish.
- 3. Keep your hands out of the mouth and gills Gills are sensitive, keep your fingers clear.
- **4. No squeezing** Squeezing can break bones or injure internal organs.
- **5. Keep them wet** The longer fish are out of the water and not wet, the more of a chance there is to harm them.
- 6. Don't overplay the fish Don't unnecessarily handle your fish.
- 7. Use fish friendly nets Rope nets can hurt fish, try and use the rubber ones.
- **8.** Watch water temperatures For trout, don't fish if the water is too warm, above 68 degrees. Keep a thermometer on you.



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April Holidays

National Beer Day

Date When Celebrated: April 7

This day was established to not only honor the history of beer but also to celebrate the Cullen–Harrison Act – an act which allowed people to buy, sell and drink beer that had 4% alcohol by volume and was signed by FDR in 1933. The day in which it went into effect, over a million and a half barrels of beer were sold. Other countries which celebrate a National Beer Day include Iceland (March 1st) and the United Kingdom (June 15th).



In 1919, the Volstead Act became law and by 1920, the entire United States was subject to Prohibition. This meant that beer, wine and grain liquors had all become illegal. While Prohibition wouldn't become appealed until December 5th, 1933, U.S citizens received an early break 8 months earlier when Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Cullen-Harrison act on April 7th, 1933. After he signed the bill, FDR is reported to have said, "I think this would be a good time for a beer." And many Americans agreed with him because huge groups of people flooded breweries and taverns all over the country. In fact, by the end of that day, over1.5 million gallons of beer ended up being sold. Beer has been enjoyed by Americans ever since.

NATIONAL Grilled Cheese Day

Date When Celebrated: April 12

National Grilled Cheese Day is an unofficial holiday which celebrates one of the most popular comfort foods on the planet: the grilled cheese. On this holiday, which just so happens to fall on April 12th, people all over the U.S and the world make themselves their favorite version of a grilled cheese sandwich. Which probably means this is one of the most delicious holidays on the calendar.

If you want to be technical about it, the pairing of bread and cheese together is something which has happened since ancient times. In fact, it was the ancient Romans who really made a point of serving bread and cheese together. However, the grilled cheese of today is really sort of a modern concoction.
