

Catch of the Month – Joe Tremblay

These pictures are from the club trip to Donovan Lakes the week of April 22-26. Joe gets catch of the month but I gave myself the thumbs up for a personal best.

Joe caught the big fish of the week, a 5 lb. 2 oz. largemouth. He also caught a 4 lb. 2 oz. fish with several 2 and 3 pounders mixed in. You can see the white popper in the corner of the fish's mouth. Plus, he caught a 1 lb. 2 oz shellcracker on a damsel fly nymph.





My best fish was a 4Lbs. 2 oz. largemouth caught while fishing with Dick Curtis. It is my largest bass on a fly rod. I was using a popper tied by Joe Tremblay, probably like the one we will tie on May 9.

Dick's big fish was a 4 lb 0 oz largemouth. He also caught several fish between 2 and 4 pounds. Dick was using one of the poppers that he showed at the April tying event

Fishing for Peacocks and other exotics By Joe Tremblay

For years I've heard tales of hard fighting peacock bass in the Amazon River but never thought I would ever get the opportunity to catch one. Then a few years ago, I started hearing of peacock bass here, in the U.S.

It seems that Florida was having problems with exotic species invading the canals of Miami. These aquarium fish, released by their owners were flourishing in the warm canals of South Florida. Florida's solution was to introduce their natural predator, the peacock bass.

Normally introducing non-native species creates as many problems as it solves. Not so for the peacocks. This Central America native cannot survive in waters below 65° F so their range is the same as their target species. In addition, Florida can now boast to be the only peacock bass fishery in the U.S. providing Florida an \$11 million annual economic benefit.

I soon found a willing partner in former club president David Darnell and off we went on a recon trip to Ft. Lauderdale. This was to be a short trip, fly in, fish 2 days and fly out the next. The mission, see if it was worth going back for more. I'll let you be the judge.

We arrived on April Fool's day and, after a phone call to Capt. Wayne Fellows, we made arrangements to meet him the following morning at a local bait shop. Capt. Wayne suggested we fish Alligator Alley the first day rather than fish the Miami canals as originally planned. Fishing Alligator Alley ranked high on my bucket list so it didn't take much to convince me to change our plans.

The next morning we met Capt. Wayne at B.J. Bait and Tackle and I noticed that the deck of his Ranger bass

boat was littered with rods. We knew that Capt. Wayne was not a fly fishing guide when we hired him and it took some time to convince him that 15+ rods on the front deck were not needed and would make fly fishing difficult.

Reluctantly, Capt. Wayne removed the rods leaving only a few stored in the center of the boat, "in case we needed them". I believe he was concerned about leaving \$3000 or more worth of rods in his truck while we fished. So if you book Capt. Wayne, be sure to mention you're a fly fisher and need a clear deck.

This was my first trip down Alligator Alley. The 78 mile long highway crosses the Everglades from Ft. Lauderdale on the

east to Naples on the west and is lined with canals on both sides. Although the canals appear to be continuous, they are not. They periodically go through underground culverts restricting access to one 6 to 10 mile section at a time.

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We fished during the week so fishing pressure was light, but still we came across several boats as we sped down the canal at 45mph. We soon reached our destination and I tied on a popper while David fished a wet fly. It only took 15 minutes of David catching fish to convince me that wet fly was the way to go.

April is early in the peacock season and the water, although warm by our standards, was still cold by peacocks standards. There were a few females nesting on the rock ledges (like the one in alligator photo) and bait fishermen are fond of casting to them repeatedly until they get angry and take the bait. Not something I wanted to do, but if you cast to the ledge and let your fly drop off the edge, you will often get a take. Sometimes it was a Mayan Cichlid (Cichlid for short), an Oscar, a Peacock bass or even a largemouth.

I quickly changed to a bucktail clouser with zonker strip and started catching fish. As a matter of fact, I caught a great variety of fish. Including Peacock, Cichlid, Oscar, largemouth bass, bowfin, and an armored catfish (another aquarium escapee).


David caught many more peacocks than I did plus an assortment of Cichlids,

Oscars and largemouth bass. We had a great day without resorting to the "Dark Side" by using one of Capt. Wayne's bait casting rods.

What I had read about Peacock bass fighting ability was definitely true. A 2 pound Peacock fights as hard as a 4 pound largemouth and never gives up.

The same is true of Cichlids and Oscars. I have caught a 2 pound bluegill and a one pound Cichlid fought every bit as hard, Oscars even more so. Even smaller fish will put a bend in your rod.





We caught fish from the first time our flies hit the water on the first day to the last cast on the last day. It was epic. The fish fought especially hard, so much so that by the end of the trip my hand was sore for a week from gripping the rod while fighting the fish. That's a good thing.


I have been on many guided trips and heard "You should have been here yesterday" often enough but not this time. Even though we were early in the exotic fish season, David and I both caught well over a hundred fish and had a great time.

I'm glad we heeded Capt. Wayne's suggestion and fished Alligator Alley the first day instead of the Miami Canals. We had such a first great day, we opted to go back to Alligator Alley the second day.

Turned out to be the right call too, because fishing was even better the second day. I'm sure that was due to knowledge imparted to us by Capt. Wayne and the information gained during our visit to Old Florida Fly Shop and the Fort Lauderdale Bass Pro Shop.

This trip was not only one of my most successful guided trips ever, I got to check off 2 items off my bucket list; Peacock Bass and Alligator Alley, making this trip hard to beat.




